## **PROJECT UPDATE AND HOSPITAL SITE WALK**

## 26 November 2021

The project team were excited to welcome twelve members of our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Community Working Group to the hospital site to provide a project update followed by a walk around the new hospital. This is the first meeting that we have been able to conduct in person since COVID-19 restrictions came into place and it was wonderful to see some familiar faces, as well as welcome some new community members.

Community Working Group members were provided an **update on construction**, with the latest <u>aerial video</u> <u>and images</u> showing concrete slab pours up to level four of the hospitals' five operational levels above ground.

Lendlease provided an update on the Aboriginal Participation In Construction (**APIC**) policy, where the project has committed to a **5%** target for contract spend towards facilitating Aboriginal participation in the project. This is well above the government requirement of **1.5%**, and includes employment with Lendlease as well as subcontractors, engagement of Indigenous owned companies for works, and supply chain.

There are seven **Aboriginal employees** currently working directly with Lendlease, with three of these in **management roles**. The current subcontractor workforce includes 39 **Aboriginal workers**.

Overall, the Tweed Valley Hospital project has achieved a total expenditure of circa \$9M (as at end of October 2021), or approximately **7%** of the overall direct costs to date. The team shared feedback on the **Secondary Art Program's** Expressions of Interest process, which included some impressive submissions from local Aboriginal artists.

An **Aboriginal Cultural Consultant** is being engaged to lead the community consultation for the artwork, as well as other cultural safety elements including language translation on signage and native planting.

Vibrant **local artist**, Hiromi Tango, was a special guest at the meeting. Hiromi invited members to share their insights and stories about local plants, which will form the 'DNA' of the **Garden sculpture** for the main foyer of the hospital.

Hiromi delighted Panel members with her vision for the feature artwork and a special gift to inspire participation in the engagement program.

The meeting concluded with a **walking tour** of the ground floor of the hospital, which will house Outpatient, Renal, Cancer Services and Medical Imaging departments, as well as a café and shop.
